MIGRANTS AND REFUGEES IN BELGIUM

26/05/2021 - 07/06/2021

 Academics at the ULB and VUB Universities in Brussels <u>called</u> on the Belgian government to define clear and objective criteria for the regularization of undocumented people.

10/05/2021 - 26/05/2021

- On 19 May 2021, Myria, the Belgian Federal Migration Centre and independent national rapporteur on trafficking in human beings, published its 2020 Annual report trafficking and smuggling of human beings, Behind closed doors.
- On 19 May 2021, around 50 Vietnamese migrants were <u>rescued</u> off **Ostende**, on the Belgian coast, while their boat was in distress at sea. They had reportedly left France for reaching the UK but the boat went adrift towards Belgium.

29.03.2021 - 12.04.2021

 Amid the <u>#wearebelgiumtoo</u> campaign for regularisation, and following several actions and occupations, the Union of Undocumented Migrants for Regularisation (USPR) <u>met</u> with Belgian Secretary of State for Asylum and Migration Sammy Mahdi for a first dialogue on regularisation.

08/02/2021 - 22/02/2021

• The occupation of the Beguinage Church and of the University ULB continues in Brussels. Around 230 undocumented people, including 90 women and some children, of seven different nationalities are currently staying in the Beguinage Church. The people, united under the movement L'union des sans papiers pour la regularisation, are calling for their immediate regularisation and the recognition of their rights. Their actions are receiving more media attention and solidarity.

8/02/2021

• Since 31 January 2021, around 200 undocumented people have occupied the Beguinage Church in Brussels with the consent of the priest. They are calling on authorities to be heard and to be regularised.

24/11 - 08/12 2020

• Belgium declared it will transfer 150 refugees from Greece by the end of 2020.

15/10 - 26/10 2020

 The so-called "Bossuyt Commission", in charge of evaluating the Belgian policy of voluntary returns and forced removal of foreigners, published its final report in mid-September 2020. Many Belgian civil society organisations produced a detailed analysis and assessment of this report, highlighting its flaws and loopholes.
